

An odyssey from Oakwood to Springfield – on foot

It is five fifty two in the morning at 312 E. Peach Orchard Drive as Bob Rice slips out his front door into the relative cool just before dawn. A balmy 67 degrees at the time with nary a bird chirping, Mr. Rice would be dealing with temperatures of 91 degrees and 90 percent

humidity to match later in the

Bob had started a journey last Thursday morning - an odyssey of one that he has accomplished five times before and was about to do again - a 31.6-mile walk to Springfield, Ohio, celebrating his 60th high school reunion at Springfield

High School. When he arrived at his destination at 9:09 p.m. Thursday - the Marriott Hotel in downtown Springfield - by his reckoning, he had taken 83,244 steps to get there.

"One of the accomplishments of the trip is that if you eat right, and exercise a lot, you can walk great distances," he

said. Bob will be turning 78 at the end of June and feels pretty healthy and in shape for a man his age. "I felt a little rough yesterday after the walk was over, but today I feel just fine."

A resident of Oakwood since 1963, Bob originally started a walking regimen back in 1980 to counteract stress on the job. He also started walking "all over Oakwood" for the pleasure of looking at all the different homes in the city. "If you want to see your community, walk it," he said.

He then decided to go for a longer stroll and walked to Route 73 south of Centerville and back – a 20-mile round trip. Next thing he knew, his 30th reunion with the Springfield Class of 1950 was coming up so he came up with the idea to go for the challenge of walking all the way to Springfield. He did it and encored with class reunions in 1990 (40th), 1995 (45th), 2000 (50th), 2005 (55th) and this year, his 60th.

His record was a Fourth of July jaunt back in 1981 to Urbana, Ohio, to visit his mother and sister who both lived there at the time. After cutting a beeline northeast from Oakwood, Rice headed up Route 235, which according to him is a pretty straight shot to Urbana. Time: 12 hours; Distance: 46 miles.

Of course, Bob has had some help. His wife of 51 years, Nancy, helps him along the journey by traveling in "the ambulance" and at pre-selected stops providing moral support, water, fruit, trail mix and band aids for the feet in case of blisters. His three sons, Doug, David, and Rob Rice, as well as his daughter Kathy Hensley, have all aided and abetted him numerous times over the years.

This year, Bob plans to take part in the Springfield Memorial Day Parade, an event he recalls fondly from his days as a Cub Scout when he marched in it when he was in the fourth and fifth grade. He is also providing commemorative T-shirts with "Go Wildcats" (the Springfield mascot) wording on the front for all his fellow reunion classmates to wear during the parade. They are the same T-shirt that Bob wears each and every time he has done on of his walks to Springfield. Go Bob!

Vote for Wright Brothers statue in U.S. Capitol

In less than two weeks, the people of Ohio will decide what famous son or daughter will represent our great state in the National Statuary Collection in the United States Capitol in Washington, D.C. You have an opportunity to select the Wright brothers as a symbol of Ohio's inventiveness, creativity, and leadership in science and technology.

The Ohio General Assembly is seeking to replace the current statue in the Capitol of William Allen, a former member of Congress and Ohio's governor from 1874-1876. To select a new statue, the legislature is seeking input from Ohioans by conducting a vote among ten

candidates.

According to Todd Fleismit, media manager for the Statuary voting program, over 13,000 votes have already been cast for the 10 Ohio candidates for the honor.

Voting is easy. The City of Oakwood website has a complete balloting entry link. Go to www. mvcc.net/oakwood and follow the directions on the website. The deadline is June 12, so make sure to send your ballot right away.

There are no Ohio subjects more worthy of honor in the National Statuary Collection than Orville and Wilbur Wright. These two brothers, who grew up in Dayton and conducted most

of their experiments in Ohio, achieved one of mankind's greatest technological innovations—the conquest of flight. Their creation of the airplane changed the world as much as any invention in the last century. Today, the aerospace industry is still a vital part of Ohio's economy.

A statue of the Wright brothers in our Nation's Capitol, which is viewed by millions of tourists each year, will send a signal to the world today and for future generations that Ohio means leadership in science, technology, and innovation.

The National American Miss Pageant is dedicated to celebrating America's greatness and encouraging its future leaders. Generous scholarships are awarded at state as well as national levels.




Lauren Murphy-Zahora If crowned queen of her state,

Kudos for Oakwood Safety Department

At the end of the last summer, and on my son's first birthday, my husband and I moved from a historical district in Dayton to Oakwood. We jokingly say that we bought our son a house with a big back yard for his first birthday. In all honesty, we moved to Oakwood because someone REALLY wanted to buy our house (which by the way, wasn't even up for sale). But we had always planned to move here eventually, once we could afford to, that is.

Like many of you, we love it here! We love the beautifully kept homes, tree lined streets, clean and safe parks, great schools, and the nice neighbors with polite children for our son to play with. But what we love the most is our police, fire

and EMT staff. I know we pay a lot for our city services, but let me assure you, they are well worth it.

In April, my son had a seizure on a Sunday morning. He was about 20 months old at the time. All of our neighbors stopped what they were doing to call for help and actually came over to help as well. The police arrived in 29 seconds; I know because I was still on my cell phone with the dispatcher and I looked at the call length. That's really fast! The EMT arrived shortly thereafter, within a couple of minutes, and the police officer rode with us to Children's Hospital. Our son was fine and he was discharged later that day. The doctors advised that we keep a close eye on our son for

the next couple of days, so I stayed home from work to look after him. On Tuesday, the police stopped by the house to see how we were doing. I was floored; what a nice gesture!!!

I don't know of ANY other community that has the services we do. You really do get what you pay for. But it's more than that, it's about living in a community where people really do care. That's something money can't buy. THANKS to everyone, especially the police, fire and EMT, for caring about us and keeping us



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OHS hosts 'Real Money Real World' simulation

After choosing a career, receiving a monthly salary, and picking a specific number of dependents, Oakwood High School ninth graders rotated through the Real Money, Real World simulation on May 20, 2010. With the assistance of community members who managed fourteen booths, the students, hoping that they would have enough money left at the end of the month, decided how to spend their money. The various stations included housing, transportation, insurance, food, child care, communications (including cell phone and cable television, contributions, and financial advice booths.

"I learned about the cost of everyday living and that you have to budget to such an extent in some areas in order to afford the necessities", "I learned how much it costs to take care of a child and how quickly money goes." These are just two statements made by Oakwood High School ninth grade students after participating in the simulation.


Oakwood High School business teacher Jamie Walker and OSU Extension Educator Christine Olinsky organized the program. A team of English and math teachers instructed students on topics regarding how occupations affect income, payroll deductions, and checking and savings accounts.


The cost of child care surprised the students the most. One youth, who came into the simulation with a monthly salary of \$1,100 and two children, was discouraged to discover at the child care booth that day care for his two children would be over \$800. Chris Stiver with Ameriprise Financial at the Help Booth assisted him in getting a second part-time job after he discovered that "giving his children back" was not an option.

Glenn Kershner from Universal 1 Credit Union made sure everyone made a minimum monthly payment on their credit card debt. Tom Swing and Tom Hart from Dorothy Lane Market, with a table full of groceries representing the four food purchase plans as their display, helped youth to understand the value in buying store brand versus name brand products. Volunteers King and Beth Merritt sold or rented houses to students and Rob Stephens from Stephens Insurance helped them insure their new assets with homeowners and automobile insurance.

At the end of the experience, comments included, "I would buy less expensive stuff," "Life is a whole lot harder than I thought," "Children cost a lot of money!" and "I need to get the important stuff out of the way first." The students thoroughly enjoyed their experience but were shocked at how hard it was to meet a monthly budget and spend within their means. Students, staff, and parents found the simulation to be a great stepping stone for financial discussions in the classroom and at the dinner table.

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


SICSA Walk for Strays June 5



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


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


Wegerzyn chief presented proclamation

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
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

8 local gardens featured on Wegerzyn tour

"A garden is not just flowers," said long-term Oakwood resident Jean Woodhull, "It's about design—pleasing combinations of shapes, colors and textures." Woodhull's garden testifies to her keen eye for design. On a wooded site with terraced sloping hills, vegetables cavort with flowers in meandering beds while native plants blend with cultivated varieties.

The Woodhull garden, registered with the Smithsonian Institute, is one of eight private gardens featured on the Wegerzyn Gardens Foundation's 2010 Garden Tour. Another Smithsonian-registered garden belongs to Pam and George Houk. "We've incorporated the large trees on our property into the overall garden design," said Pam. George added, "And we've put the wood from fallen trees to good use in building walls, tuteurs and other garden structures." The couple enjoys harvesting fresh herbs and vegetables from their fenced kitchen garden. A lily pond near the arts-and-crafts bungalow are home to colorful aquatic plants as well as fish and frogs.

Smaller gardens are also featured on Wegerzyn's biennial tours. Two Stockton Avenue homes are inspirational examples of how to convert a modest urban lot into a captivating garden. The self-effac-

ing owner of one property, Steve Datz, says, "If I can do it, anyone can." Begun as a 12-inch border of begonias, his garden has blossomed into lovingly tended beds that he and his wife Dana intend to continue to expand.

The 2010 Garden Tour is self-guided and the hours are Saturday, June 5, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday, June 6, noon to 5 p.m. Tickets are \$10 in advance of the tour days at Ashley's Pastries; Inside Out; Blue Turtle Toys; Oakwood Florist; Knollwood Garden Center; Siebenthaler Garden Centers; Cox Arboretum MetroPark; Wegerzyn Gardens MetroPark; and Wegerzyn Gift and Garden Shop in the PNC 2nd Street Market. 

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Cincinnati Opera 90th season opens with gala

Cincinnati is coming! Don't be alarmed, it is not an invasion of the Gem City by the Queen City.

What I really mean is Cincinnati Opera is coming! Our neighbors to the south provide Dayton's opera lovers with a complete festival one short hour away. After the season of Dayton Opera's delights, we can still indulge our passion.

This season is the 90th anniversary of Cincinnati Opera. As the second oldest opera company in America, there is much to celebrate. As important as the history – the great news is their season - celebrating the very essence of opera

To mark the anniversary, a gala and star-studded concert is scheduled on June 19. It will be an opera romp. The list of stars is impressive and includes many international favorites.

More important is the experience of an opera gala. Orchestra, chorus, and stars are all there having a great time. Often, the printed program cannot contain the chemistry when these artists, friends, colleagues, are able to come together to sing their favorite arias.

An opera gala is the "hard ticket" answer to the chemistry of a rock concert. The only difference is that the opera artists are really singing!

The rest of the season stands on the very summit of grand opera. Wagner's only comedy and my personal favorite opera, *Die Meistersinger*, opens the regular season on June 23 and 26th. This is followed by Verdi's *Otello* on July 7 and 10. The season closes with everyone's favorite, Puccini's *La Boheme* playing, July 21-24 and 25th.

The list of operas is enough reason to attend. Add to that

the special verve which marks Cincinnati Opera.

"Meistersinger" is a rare treat. Daunting to produce, demanding of cast and orchestra, the opera is a challenge, even to the audience. Evans has created a European experience to make the evening as the lovely characters of medieval Nürnberg come to life in Cincinnati.

In most opera houses on the continent, Wagner's operas become an occasion. The acts are divided by leisurely intermissions marked with libations, gustatory treats and conversation. How the new health care reform will affect seniors

There remains great concern among seniors about how the new Health Reform Law will affect them, and it will be years before the true effect of the law among this group of citizens is known. However, some aspects of the law are clear, and the hope is that the overall positives will outweigh the negatives when all is said and done.

Among the negatives are broad cuts in projected Medicare payments to insurance plans, hospitals, nursing homes, and other service providers. Although many projections have been made, this is one area in which it is too early to evaluate the size of reductions or its effect. Another negative is that those seniors enrolled in private insurance plans under Medicare Advantage will likely face higher premiums and reduced benefits. Prior to passage of the new law, private insurers were subsidized by the government to manage Medicare programs on the government's behalf. The government will begin lowering the subsidies to these private plans likely resulting in higher premiums to the insured. Also, although basic Medicare benefits will not be reduced, extras such as eyeglasses may be reduced or

There are also significant benefits for seniors in the new health reform law. One is the elimination of the drug prescription "doughnut hole". The "doughnut hole" is a gap

in Medicare prescription coverage that begins when an individual has spent the first \$2,830 of prescription expense in a year and continues until he/she has spent \$4,550 when Medicare begins paying 95% of the expense. This year, seniors will receive \$250 to fill the "doughnut hole". Next year, seniors who reach the "doughnut hole" will receive a 50% discount on brand-name prescriptions and 7% on generics. The gap will narrow each year until 2020, when the "doughnut hole" will disappear entir ely.

Another benefit for seniors is expanded wellness and preventive care coverage. Beginning in 2011, many preventive services will be available at no charge for seniors who receive Medicare. Mammograms and other cancer and diabetes screening will be available at no charge. Also available at no charge will be annual wellness visits, allowing for individuals to receive health risk assessments and personalized prevention plans.

Other highlights of the plans, which will or may affect seniors are as follows: basic Medicare benefits will not be cut; those with preexisting conditions will be able to get insurance coverage through the government until 2014, at which time all insurance plans must cover preexisting conditions; makes health insurance more affordable for somestarting in 2014, many individuals and families will get tax credits to help them purchase insurance cover-

It is still very unclear how Medicare cuts will affect the quality of as well as the cost of private health insurance. Chris Pulos, a principal at Brower Insurance Agency in Dayton, is very knowledgeable on this subject. He has spent extensive time reading and reviewing every page of the law. Pulos shared his thoughts and said, "Although this Bill is now law, the situation is still fluid. I believe over the course of the next few years there will be many changes to the legislation. As we approach 2014, (where the real teeth in this Bill exists) our politicians and the public will have to address and maneuver through the complexities of executing the provisions within the law; and we are hopeful that they will be able to simplify this process for the public good, prior to that target date." We all hope that the new health care reform will overall put the Medicare program in a better position over the long term than it has been before or would be without the reform legislation Time will tell!

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

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


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
