
# 2010 Oakwood High School 86th Annual Commencement

# OJHS mulling switch from trimesters to semesters

Oakwood Junior High School could be switching its class scheduling from trimesters to semesters (four quarters) beginning with the 2011-12 school year.

Principal Dan Weckstein presented the preliminary information to the Board of Education last night, emphasizing it is "not finalized yet." He said he began evaluating the change about 1-1/2 years ago, followed by developing a focus group that has been meeting to discuss why the school had switched to trimesters years ago and to weigh the pros and

cons of both types of schedules.

According to Weckstein, one of the biggest reasons for the proposed switch is it would allow for more elective classes. It will "give junior high students more classes to explore, more choices," he said. It would also provide an easy transition

to high school scheduling which is currently on semesters, he noted.

Among the specific changes proposed is that seventh graders would be able to have a health class and combine it with PE for half the year. "That's a very good bonus to switching," said Weckstein. Likewise,

eighth graders can combine composition and speech for half the year.

Seventh graders may also be introduced to a computer apps course, and spend less time with a foreign language before going to a full year of it in eighth grade.

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# Dialogue ongoing regarding Athletic/Recreation Master Plan

Over the past year the city has been working on a master plan that addresses Oakwood athletic and recreation facilities. The plan focuses on the following four sites: 1) Old River Field; 2) Oakwood Community Center; 3) Irving Field; and, 4) Creager Field. City Council received a detailed briefing about the plan at a public meeting on May 24 and is scheduled to vote on adoption of the plan at their June 21 council meeting.

In 2004, Oakwood City Council approved the Oakwood Comprehensive Plan, a document that addresses issues involving city-wide land use, transportation and public facilities planning. The 2004 Comprehensive Plan includes several sections relating to athletic and recreation space needs and planning, and includes citizen feedback confirming the need for the city to consider athletic and recreation facility capital improvements.

The 2004 Comprehensive Plan includes the following specific objective: "Study the desirability, feasibility and cost implications of constructing new indoor and/or outdoor recreational facilities within and around Oakwood; proceed with projects as supported by the community and if funding is available." This objective provided the basis for writing the master plan.

When adopted, the Oakwood Athletic/Recreation Master Plan will serve as a guide for athletic and recreation facility operations, maintenance, and capital improvements over the next 5-10 years. The master plan will include a vision for the future, taking into consideration the existing facilities, as well as unmet athletic and recreation needs as identified by our citizens and city leaders.

A significant number of Oakwood citizens participated in developing the plan and thus it truly reflects the voice of our community. During the course of the master planning process we:

- Were assisted by a 25-member citizen committee; the committee included representation from each of our seven voting precincts and one representative each from our Planning Commission, **Budget Review Committee** Comprehensive Planning Committee. We also had a school board member and our high school athletic director on the committee. The committee met eight times, spending about 2 hours in each meeting.
- Conducted four community-wide public input meetings. The last meeting took place on April 29 and included about 150 residents. A video of that meeting can be viewed from our city website (www.mvcc.net/oakwood).
- Mailed a 12-page athletic and recreation wants/ needs survey to every property in Oakwood; nearly 400 property owners completed and returned it.
- Interviewed 22 selected Oakwood citizens and asked a series of questions relating to athletic and recreation facilities and programs.
- Conducted a telephone survey with 400 Oakwood residents selected randomly; the survey includ-

ed 21 questions relating to athletic and recreation programs and facilities. The results of this survey provide a statistically valid snapshot of the entire community.

We are certainly a community blessed with citizens who care about all facets of the city... and care enough to invest their time on city business.

To assist the community in understanding the scope of the master plan project, the city sent an informational brochure to every residential and business property in Oakwood. That brochure generated a large amount of citizen response, which in turn led to some significant changes to the plan.

In developing the Master Plan, we repeatedly explained the purpose of the plan and that it serves as a general planning guide only and will not, by itself, automatically lead to any specific construction projects or any direct expenditure of public funds. The Master Plan is a flexible document easily modified and amended as community desires and needs change. To stress this point and further clarify the plan purpose, consider the following:

#### The Master Plan is:

- a document that provides a professional assessment of the current condition of the city's four primary athletic/recreation facilities (OCC, Old River, Irving Field and Creager Field.)
- a document that includes a broad-based citizen perspective of existing conditions and future needs.
- > a document that provides

- a snapshot of citizen wants and needs as determined through a series of public outreach efforts.
- a document that begins to address recreation and open space wants in a pro-active way.
- a document that provides written design guidelines for potential future development.
- a document that identifies potential recreation and athletic field opportunities now available to the community with the 2006 acquisition of the Old River Field property.
- a document that provides an assessment of the market for public athletic and recreation facilities.
- a document to be used by City Council and the community to identify priorities for athletic and recreation facilities and services.
- a document that depicts several possible capital improvement concepts for the subject sites taking into account citizen preferences.
- a document that can be used to avoid duplication of services while identifying gaps in existing programs and facilities.
- a working document that can be modified or edited at any time in the future.

The Master Plan is not...

a document that commits the city of Oakwood to take any specific action or to spend any public funds.

- a design document that explains and/or depicts something that the city is planning to build.
- a blue print that commits the community or elected officials to any specific plan or course of action either now or in the future.
- a static document that can not be changed or otherwise modified as community needs change.
- the final step in garnering citizen input and involvement in helping establish future recreation and athletic space priorities.
- a document that assumes the city has the financial resources available to undertake any potential capital improvements.

Many people have asked: "So what's the next step?" The answer is simple. We continue the dialogue. This will take place through meetings with our Budget Review Committee and our Comprehensive Planning Committee, through continuing discussions with our Oakwood Schools officials, and through direct dialogue with our citizens. Although there are certainly varying opinions on what projects, if any, we should begin planning for, I am confident that with enough time investment and citizen involvement, we will make decisions that are in the very best interests of our wonderful city. Thanks for being involved.

# 2010 Aviation Hall of **Fame Enshrinees named**

2010 Enshrinement presenters to include Apollo astronauts, air show legend July events mark the 49th annual National Aviation Hall of Fame Enshrinement ceremonies; Milton Caniff "Spirit of Flight" Award.

Presenters for the National Aviation Hall of Fame's 2010 Enshrinement ceremony include two men who have flown to the moon; a legendary air show performer, and one of Ohio's political native sons.

On July 17, 2010, the National Aviation Hall of Fame will induct its Class of 2010 in black-tie ceremonies at the Dayton Convention Center

"This is the Oscar night of aviation," said NAHF Enshrinement Director Ron Kaplan. "Along with the air and space pioneers being enshrined, we have some giants in aviation history lined up to present each honoree.'

Presenting the 2010 Enshrinees: Navy Capt. Richard "Dick" Gordon, ret., command module pilot of the 1969 Apollo 12 mission, will present 2010 Enshrinee Navy Capt. Alan Bean, ret., lunar module pilot for Apollo 12, commander of Skylab 3, and a noted artist.

• Bob Hoover, the legendary pilot, air show performer and 1988 Hall of Fame Enshrinee, will introduce 2010 Enshrinee Clay Lacy, a 50,000-plus hour pilot, business aviation icon and aerial cinematographer for such Hollywood productions as Top Gun and The Right Stuff.

- Clarence "Bud" Brown, businessman, former congressman and gubernatorial candidate in Ohio, will present 2010 Enshrinee Warren Grimes, the "father of aircraft lighting" and noted aviation innovator. Co-accepting on behalf of Grimes, who passed away in 1975, will be his daughter Gloria Grimes Creviston, and his grandson, William G. Creviston.
- USAF Maj. Gen.William A. Anders, ret., lunar module pilot for Apollo 8, the former CEO of General Dynamics and a 2004 Hall of Fame Enshrinee, will introduce 2010 Enshrinee Noel Wien, an Arctic flight expert who founded Wien Alaska Airlines, one of the earliest airlines in the United States and who has been listed as one of the 10 greatest pilots of all time. Co-accepting on behalf of Wien, who passed away in 1977, will be his sons Noel Merrill Wien and Richard A. Wien.

In addition to the 2010 Enshrinment ceremonies, the 2010 Milton Caniff "Spirit of Flight" Award will be presented to the 8,000-member-company National Business Aviation Association, the world's foremost organization in representing the interests of business aviation. The award is given each year to a group or organization in recognition of its achievement in advancing aviation.

The "Spirit of Flight Award" will be bestowed at the NAHF's President's Reception & Dinner at the Hall of Fame's Learning Center and the National Museum of the United States Air Force on July 16,




# Virginia Bernthal Toulmin

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

# Poet performs one-man show Through the Night

Burt Saidel



Daniel Beaty is a poet. His heart resonates the great truths of the human experience in a language so clear, so charged with honesty, delivered with the devotion of an Olympian athlete.

Danny is a native Daytonian, a graduate of the Miami Valley School where he became, and will always be, a David Saidel Scholar.

Last Saturday evening, at the Schuster Center, he was the featured guest at the third annual Blue Moon Affair hosted by the Community Action Partnership. The gala dinner

and the litany of great works performed by this devoted organization were deservedly lauded. The large crowd was testimony to the support of the community for this organization supporting so many.

Danny is presently performing his latest one-man show, *Through the Night*. Like his initial blockbuster *EmergenceSEE*, it has been greeted by sell-out houses in Los Angeles, Boston and now a long run in New York City.

Daniel's métier is the Black experience. He owns this message as did Faulkner and Wolfe own the South and O'Neill the dysfunction of addiction. Like a true poet, his vision may be focused on what he knows best but his message soars to encompass all humanity.

A single actor, Daniel, plays all the

characters. In *Through the Night*, six interrelated individuals re-synthesize their lives through parallel experiences

Danny assumes each character's voice and persona. His acting is so riveting that once we meet the character, we recognize it instantly. The dramatic agon builds into crescendos and recedes into narrative as skillfully as a maestro would conduct a fine symphony orchestra.

In a rapt hour, the audience is mesmerized by the play and impacted by the enduring message. Danny has done the equivalent of a decathlon; he emerges smiling and refreshed while the audience is recovering from this tidal wave of truth.

I have spent a long lifetime under the inspiration of poets of all ages and several languages. I revere their genius and remain challenged by their effect. I have known a great poet for these many years – it is Daniel Beaty. I revel in the pride I feel and in the burden of the truths he makes so clear.

#### **Barnes Art Museum**

The Barnes Museum, located in Merion, Pennsylvania on Philadelphia's main line, has been something of an enigma. At the turn of the last century, Albert Coombs Barnes, a physician, invented an antiseptic, Argyrol, to combat gonorrhea and ophthalmic infections in the preantibiotic days

Immense profits from this single medication gave Barnes the opportunity to indulge his passion for art. This was a time when the French Impressionists were near-contemporaries and their paintings were marketed affordably, compared to the mega-millions they command today.

The museum is located in what was the most exclusive residential suburb at the time. The huge mansion, acquired by Barnes in 1922, houses the voluminous collection in the manner of the great houses and palaces of centuries ago.

The art works are literally floor to ceiling in connecting rooms that have the feeling of a mansion, not a public building. This is unique in these days of spacious museum galleries and well-organized and well-labeled collections. The labels on the paintings, for example, are tiny brass plates only naming the artist and readable with some difficulty.

While I revel in the magnificence of our new museums, I love to visit this rare collection and its special

# **OSEF** awards \$34,000 in spring teacher grants

The Oakwood Schools Education Foundation recently completed its Spring Grants cycle and is delighted to announce that it will be funding over \$34,000 in teacher and administrator grants, bringing the Education Foundation's total grant support to over \$490,000.

Weckstein said the change would not affect the core classes, like math, science, English and history. Midterm exams would fall around Martin Luther King Day, he added.

The proposed switch still has a few months of work in progress before it would go to the Board for final approval, according to Weckstein.

During the Board meeting's

curricular showcase, teacher Lori Morris introduced the high school's Academic Decathlon team and its state champions Ethan Kissock and Erin Cox. "The kids have had a phenomenal year...they did a fantastic job," said Morris, who coordinates the team.

Kissock presented his winning speech about a student suffering with epilepsy from age 11 to 17, and his struggle and hope to overcome it with a radical diet. Cox gave her speech about a young "insane" woman with ADD, her emotional conflicts and her optimistic view for the future.

Among other commendations at the Board meeting were:

\*The Class of 2010, who ranked first in the state on the OGT, had 11 National Merit Finalists and Commended Scholars, and earned \$3.5 million in scholarships. Of the 149 graduates, 142 plan to attend college, three will enter the military and four plan to travel for a year. # Does using test scores for teacher pay work?

The 6-1-10 Washington Post headline was a real slap in the face for those who argue so strongly that student test scores should be a major factor in determining teacher pay--even employment. It read, "Chicago's teacher performance pay didn't work--new analysis." The article by Valerie Strauss points out that the early results from a program implemented when the Current US Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan, led the Chicago school system do NOT support the hopes of those who seek simplistic accountability for teachers.

The study conducted by Mathematical Policy Research, Inc. shows NO evidence "that the Chicago Teacher Advancement Program (TAP) improved student math and reading tests when compared with a group of similar schools that did not use the system." Strauss says that the analysis examined the first two years of a four-year program which included teacher development and an incentive pay system by which teachers whose pupils scored better would get extra pay.

She stressed that this

"performance-pay" concept "ignores the fact that standardized tests in schools today were not designed as teacher assessment tools and are not valid measures." Measuring goal X with a test to measure Y is just plain wrong. Yet she notes that many school systems are jumping onto this latest simple solution bandwagon in order to "win" \$\$ in the federal 'Race to the Top' competition.

One political "reformist" backed away from the TAP effort when he stated, "We can't expect immediate results." Strauss counters with these questions. "Why is it, then, that education officials can recognize that reforms take a long time even though they are pushing states to undertake reforms right now when they have no research base of success?" Simple solutions are rarely simple, nor are they real solutions and that is my own assessment.

One of the key elements of the development of Oakwood's quality program of education including curriculum, instruction and professional development has been a dedication to research and careful planning! Thus when our school system has considered changes, they have been well studied and the teachers have been given help to make sure that the anticipated expectations are realized. 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
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
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
