Jonah's Jog 5K Run/Walk slated for Saturday

on Dec. 17, 2008, his mother Ellen had no reason to believe that he would do anything but thrive. He was perfect from his hands to his toes. He spent his first few months slightly jaundiced, but she was reassured that this was fairly common in babies and it was most likely because of breast-feeding and would clear. It wasn't until his four-month check-up, where he still had his jaundiced complexion, that his doctor became concerned and ordered more detailed blood tests. The results showed that there was something terribly wrong, but the question was what exactly?

Jonah was immediately admitted to Dayton Children's Medical Center and underwent what seemed to be countless tests. His liver biopsy showed severe cirrhosis of the liver. His liver was failing. At the tender age of four months Jonah was diagnosed with a rare liver disease known as biliary atresia. This rare disease, of which there is no known cause or cure, damages the liver and quickly leads to liver failure. Ellen was told that he would need a liver transplant in order to save his life. He would not make it to the age of one without a transplant. According to Ellen, her body went numb after hearing those words. She couldn't believe what the doctors were telling her. "Is that even possible, to transplant a child? " she thought to herself. She had spent her first few months of motherhood worrying about stuffy noses and diaper rash, and never even imagined being faced with her son in liver failure.

"There were no words to begin to describe the helplessness I felt," she said.

Jonah was transferred to Cincinnati Children's Hospital to be evaluated by their liver transplant team. He was immediately placed on the national transplant waiting list and because his condition worsened rapidly, Ellen and her family only waited three weeks before receiving the call that they had a liver for Jonah.

"It was the longest most ago-

When Jonah Mays was born nizing three weeks of waiting:, not knowing when and trying not to think of the dreaded "if" we were going to receive the call," she said. Some moments she found herself positive and hopeful and other times consumed and overwhelmed by the heartbreaking statistics of the number of patients that die while waiting for an organ.

> On June 25, 2009 at 2:50 in the afternoon she got the call that they had a liver for Jonah and to come to Cincinnati Children's Hospital as soon as possible. Dayton Children's Medical Center graciously arranged for an ambulance to take them there. Ellen was thankful because she was so overcome with emotions that she didn't think she could have made the drive.

> On June 26, 2009, Jonah, just six months old, received his gift of life, and was given a liver transplant. It was a nine-hour surgery during which Ellen could not stop thinking about the remarkable decision a family had just made - a decision that saved her son's life.

> It will be one year ago this Saturday that Jonah's journey began at Dayton Children's. Ellen can't think of a more precious gift than to have Jonah with her today. And she can't even begin to find the words to thank the family for their incredible, courageous, and selfless decision to donate their son's organs. They are the true heroes.

> To commemorate Jonah's new life with a new liver, Ellen has organized a fundraiser entitled Jonah's Jog 5K Run/Walk, to be held on Saturday, June 26, starting at 8:30 a.m. Between 100 to 150 walkers/joggers are expected to participate in the event which will begin on Schantz Avenue between Oakwood High School and Mack Hummon Field.

> A number of organizations such as the Children's Organ Transplant Association and Life Connection of Ohio will be there. Oakwood City Mayor William Duncan will also be making an appearance to speak on behalf of

organ donation.

Ashley's Pastry Shop will be providing food and Dayton Children's Medical Center will be providing runners bags to the participants. Ellen also mentioned T-shirts will also be provided to the runners.

City Council City welcomes new Law Director

The Oakwood City Council met on Monday evening, June 21 with all members counted as present. City Manager Norbert Klopsch got the proceedings underway by introducing the city's new Law Director, Robert F. Jacques. Mr. Jacques has been serving for the past three years as Assistant Law Director for the city. He is a 1992 graduate of Oakwood High School. He earned his bachelors degree from Wabash College and his Juris Doctorate from The Ohio State University School of Law. He is taking over the post from Dalma Grandjean, who is returning to full-time practice at the law firm of Altick & Corwin.

A resolution to adopt the Athletic/Recreation Master Plan came up for vote. City Manager Norbert Klopsch cited community input as being a major help in formulating the Master Plan and noted that the project started 11 months ago on July 23. "I think the key is that it

(the Master Plan) is so flexible," said Councilmember Stanley Castleman. The council voted a unanimous "yes" on the resolution and further refinement and development of the various options already presented to the public will continue apace.

A pet grooming studio to be located at 2419 Far Hills Ave. in Oakwood had been previously OK'd by the Oakwood Planning Commission in a public hearing on June 2 and was voted a unanimous "yes" by council on the ordinance. The studio, entitled La Paw, will offer domestic house pet grooming and 60 percent of its space will be devoted to retail use for the sale of pet supplies and related merchandise.

Leisure Services Director Carol Collins presented an update on plans and programs that have been held over the past year. According to Collins, the many programs that dot the Oakwood activity calendar are very popular and accentuate the "ambience" of the community

and give the city its own unique atmosphere.

City Manager Norbert Klopsch gave a very brief report, bringing to council's attention that Mike Kelly, who was at two different times in his 32-year career with Oakwood, Police Chief and City Manager, was involved in a very serious automobile accident recently and asked for the community to remember him in their thoughts and wish him a full recovery.

In Council Comments, Mayor Bill Duncan announced he received a thank you letter from CARE Walk coordinator Leigh Ann Fulford announcing that the annual walk garnered over \$17,500 this year for breast cancer research.

Mayor Duncan also mentioned that he will be taking part in Jonah's Jog 5K Run/Walk slated for this Saturday at 8:30 a.m. on Schantz Ave. between OHS and Mack Hummon Stadium.

The next formal meeting is scheduled for July 12, 2010.

ence sessions related to leadership roles and challenges being faced by professional women.



Reward offered for tips on 'bottle bombs'

The Oakwood Public Safety Department announced today that a reward of up to \$250 is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the construction and placement of "bottle bombs" near the homes of two Oakwood school officials on June 12. The "bottle bombs" were filled with BB gun ammunition and other chemicals and exploded outside the homes of two Oakwood Schools employees last weekend, one living on Oak Knoll and the other on Fairmont Avenue.


"We are taking these incidents very seriously," stated Alexander Bebris, Director of Public Safety. " While it might be seen as a prank, in fact it is a dangerous stunt. With the way these devices were constructed, it's only luck that someone wasn't seriously injured."



Cincinnati Opera celebrates 90th year with Gala





Cincinnati Opera turned 90 last Saturday evening. It is said that age 80 is today's 50. Cincinnati Opera is far better than that. At age 90, it continues to emerge as one of the most vital opera companies in the world. Under the dynamic artistic guidance of Evans Mirageas and the leadership of General Director Patty Beggs, celebrating her own 25th anniversary with the company, the "other end of I-75" makes summer burst with operatic brilliance and excitement.

To mark this milestone, a gala concert followed a sumptuous dinner. Past glories were recalled and a buffet of the upcoming season was revealed. The concert was a nonstop display of what makes Grand Opera grand.

Accompanied by the Cincinnati Symphony artists and conductors' "relay" (the baton was actually passed) among Edoardo Müller, Steven Reineke and Henri Venanzi, great singers such as Denyce Graves, Angela Brown and Richard Leech recalled their past C.O. triumphs.

The concert was also a fashion parade. Played on an elegant "picture frame" set complete with crystal chandeliers, the lovely ladies in gorgeous gowns overshadowed the handsome men, not vocally but in couture. Denyce Graves has to win the gold medal for her display of three, or was it four, stunning dresses.

We were also introduced to an exciting pageant of debuts this season. Verdi's *Otello* will be heard July 7 and 10. The entire cast of this compelling drama will be fresh voices and new faces on the Music Hall stage. Maria Luigia Borsi, Russell Thomas, Antonello Palombi, Catherine Keen and Nathan Stark proved that the *Otello* will be another Cincinnati marvel.

Borsi, a beautiful young woman with a voice for the decades to come, was the Puccini soprano of the evening. She burst onto the stage singing "Un bel di" from "Butterfly" and "Doretta's Dream" from *La Rondine*. I can only imagine her as the lovely Desdemona in *Otello*.

Russell Thomas, the future Cassio, sang one of my favorite arias "Ach, so fromm": from *Martha* with a rich, full-bodied voice. He then joined Richard Leech and Gregory Turay, the Rodrigo in *Otello*, in a romp through the "tenor national anthem" "Nessun dorma."

Choral singing was prominent with the Opera, May Festival and Allen Temple choruses, each belting out great music. If there was a criticism, it was that all was too short. I would have been content to remain until the wee hours of the morning to hear more – much more.

Interspersing the music were delightful anecdotes about the great days of Cincinnati Opera. As hosts, soprano Carol Neblett and baritone, Sherrill Milnes, both legends, gave their own remembrances. They were joined by the cyber-presentations of Martina Arroyo, Placido Domingo, and incomparable visionaries, the late Ralph and Patricia Corbett. The days of opera at the Zoo were recalled with broad grins and memories of seals and peacocks getting "into the act."

A beautiful and tasteful tribute to Louise Nippert, to whom the concert was dedicated, recognized her continuing devotion to the arts and life of Cincinnati. It brought the audience to its feet as a spotlight shone on this amazing woman.

Again, congratulations to Evans, Patty and all who make Cincinnati Opera great. Thank you for adding so much to the lives of Dayton's opera lovers.

Now that I have seen the play, my promise was correct but an under-



statement. The cast all have Dayton roots. They joined with the music of piano magician Sean Michael Flowers and the direction of Kevin Moore to create a healthy portion of theater magic.

I knew that the return of Tory Ross from her national successes would be memorable. Katie Pees, the inventor of "darling," always delivers special wit and comedic magnetism. Now a New Yorker, Scott Hunt inserts his mutable personality into his characters with complete commitment. The result - a riveting performance. Jamie Cordes, a WSU professor, walks both sides of the street. At home in opera and in musical theater, his handsome persona always becomes an audience focus.

Ordinary Days is the work of playwright/composer Adam Gwon. Many honors and much potential will make Adam's name a familiar and valuable part of American musical theater.

The play is a literary masterpiece. Four characters, separate stories, interrelate in a plot well-laced with enigma and agon. The play opens as each sings a soliloquy. The important empathy between actors' personae and the audience is so often missing. Gwon knows his craft and puts the audience into the emotional cauldron, caring deeply about each character.

The handsome couple, Troy and Jamie are a pair. They live together in a relationship consummated but unrequited. He is a romantic but cannot express his love. She is strangely cold to his enthusiasm for life.

Katie is a malcontent, long on charm but short on commitment. A graduate student by default, she is working on a doctoral dissertation for no good reason. Scott is a free spirit. He is a house and cat sitter for an unsuccessful artist who is in jail. He loves life but cannot understand why.

Somehow, in scenes full of charm, real music and fine performances, the mysteries of their lives, and life in general, in the teeming anonymity of New York, create a memorable play.

Tory Ross began as a Muse Machine sensation. She has had an unbroken string of successes as a character actress in plays and film. I expected to see and hear her talents as a character actress. In *Ordinary Days*, she emerged as a leading lady, and will continue as one. Brava, Tory; Bravi to Jamie, Katie, Scott and Sean. You are all great actors and great persons.



Two OHS renovation projects begin

Renovation work began on two major projects at Oakwood High School last week before students were done with exams in order to get the projects completed before school starts back up in August. The first project is the new gymnasium floor in the east gym or "The Pit." The Oakwood Athletic Boosters are paying to get a new floor installed in the gym, to replace the original one which is over 75 years old. They have plans to raise funds by selling engraved sections of the old floor.

The second major project is the renovation of the existing industrial arts space into two classrooms to accommodate enhancement of Industrial Arts into Pre-Engineering. One side will be a classroom filled with computers so that students can design engineering projects, while the other side will contain the equipment to manufacture the designs. This project will be paid for with revenues from the Permanent Improvement Levy, which cannot be used for operating expenses. Both projects will be completed before classes resume on Tuesday, Aug. 24.


