Jungian workshop at St. Paul's Oct. 24

Ann Ulanov was interviewed on PBS's FRONTLINE in the wake of 911 and had much to say regarding the relationship between religion and aggression, and the need for healing the psyche as a crucial deterrent to violence in the world. Dr. Ulanov, an author of thirty books, is a professor of Psychiatry and Religion at Union Theological Seminary and a Jungian analyst in New York City.
