

3 named Distinguished Alumni Award winners

By Amy Borgert On May 13, 2010, the Oakwood High School Alumni Board will recognize the third class of Distinguished Alumni Award winners - Peter Armentrout, Kim Faris-Weimer, and Rick Schwartz. These three individuals have made significant contributions to their industries and their communities, and best exemplify what it means to be a graduate of Oakwood High School. And while they are being recognized now, these three individuals' careers are far from over. In the midst of great productivity and contribution, they talked to me about where they have been, how they got where they are today, where they might go from here, and what advice they might share for future distinguished alumni.

Peter Armentrout

Peter Armentrout is as sure as science. As a young student at Oakwood High School, Peter knew he wanted a career in science and was also certain enough about one of his classmates, Mary Ann White (class of 1971), who is now his wife (and also a chemist). As an accomplished chemistry professor at the University of Utah, Armentrout leads research on using guided ion-beam mass spectrometry to provide high-quality bond dissociation data for otherwise unwieldy systems. While that may not translate well to non-scientists, it means a lot to fellow thermodynamics and chemistry colleagues.

As a member of the Class of 1971, Armentrout gravitated towards chemistry and physics, knowing that science was his thing, but was able to diversify his attentions and enjoy a well-rounded high school experience

at Oakwood through participation in a variety of activities. Challenging teachers helped Armentrout develop good study habits. Science department stand-outs Ted Shisler and Oliver Sipe helped Armentrout develop a strong foundation on which to build his education. He was also able to enjoy participation in theatre and debate, which provided a nice distraction and provided balance to his structured science classes, but also helped him focus on his goals.

Upon graduation from Oakwood, Armentrout activated his career in thermodynamics at Case Western Reserve University and then as a graduate student and fellow at the California Institute of Technology. His research contributions were recognized, and by 1981, Armentrout was an assistant professor at the University of California at Berkeley. Numerous fellowships, international recognitions, and awards later, today Armentrout is a Distinguished Professor of Chemistry at the University of Utah, and just recently stepped down as Chairman of the Chemistry Department - a position

he held for over 6 years.

His career has been a very successful one, but perhaps most personally rewarding has been his experience teaching – one that has facilitated the development of new generations of scientists to continue his work – the labor of love that is research. As a teacher, he believes there are key lessons students today should understand regarding their education.

Don't be afraid to work hard, and take ownership of your own education. Go out and get the information you need to learn, because it will not always be given to you.

As a student, if you don't know what you want to do, expose yourself to a broad range of courses and find out what excites you early on.

His colleagues and students are undoubtedly familiar with his ethic, and respect the collaboration and scientific discussion prompted by his broad and open-minded character. Colleague Kenji Honma, professor at the Graduate School of Material Science at the University of Hyogo in Japan, is impressed not only by his

outstanding scientific achievements, but also by the reliability of the data he produces. This seemingly simple matter has been the product of stateof-the-art experimental technique and uncompromising quality, leading to precise information about chemical reactions and beautifully accurate measurements – a true success to those in the field of ion chemistry and thermodynamics.

Armentrout believes his own determination, perseverance, and focus helped him achieve this great level of success. He has had his share of setbacks, and bumps in the road - getting fired from his first job for instance - but when things don't go right, Armentrout believes you just have to work that much harder and not let vourself become a victim. He also believes those hobbies and extra activities that one enjoys enable you to relieve some pressure and have some enjoyment when one part of your life isn't going so well. Because ultimately, success to Peter Armentrout is being happy and contributing to society. It is this success that makes him a Distinguished

Alumni of Oakwood High School.

Kim Faris has made a career out of her personality. While she may not have always realized it, her tremendous heart and positive nature speak to everyone around her. On air she brightens listeners' days, and off air she contributes selflessly to the communities around her. While this Class of 1974 graduate seemed destined to perform, the airwaves were not always the obvious choice.

As a student at Oakwood, Kim enjoyed the diversity of curriculum and classmates, as well as teachers that saw the potential in students and made it enjoyable to learn. As one of Mr. Zimmerman's music students, Kim was encouraged to go to the state high school soloist competition for singing. He chose an Italian aria for her to sing, and sat at the piano after school, going through it word by word, teaching her the pronunciation. The day of the solo competition, she received a superior rating - and the knowledge she could achieve whatever she set her sights on.

After graduation from Oakwood. Kim headed to Cazenovia College in New York to study dance, and her dream was to open up her own studio so she could teach others. However, an accidental injury derailed her plans and sent her on a detour from major to major. It was a visit to a studio with a performing arts group where she saw a disc jockey in action and realized what she wanted to do. 



Hardy hails from Oakwood originally, having attended Edwin D. Smith elementary as a child from third through sixth grade and graduating from Oakwood High School with the class of 1952.

Hardy just celebrated another milestone in his life as well. On April 15, he retired from Wright-Patterson AFB after 53 years there as an engineer.

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





Irvin H. Philharmonic concert features Hung symphonic debut

Maestro Neal Gittleman's programming for the Philharmonic is challenging, interesting and, above all, musically entertaining. For the final April concert, Neal's program included inviting guest conductor John DeMain to visit Dayton. DeMain is Director of both Madison, Wisconsin's symphony and opera and has wideranging credits.

In addition, Concertmaster Jessica Hung made her symphonic debut playing the musical gem, Max Bruch's Violin Concerto No.

1. The Philharmonic has such wonderful musicians. A recent concert of the Principal Quartet was proof positive. Using our principal players as soloists is a perfect enhancement of our season program and of their careers.

On May 2, Principal French Horn Robert Johnson will play a Mozart horn concerto at Symphony Sundaes. Jessica will return to the solo spotlight on May 26/27 in the final Chamber Concert. These bright young stars are not a diminution of soloist quality but an addition of passion and youthful verve.

The concert program was a perfect mix of musical styles. The featured works, the Bruch concerto and.Berlioz' monumental Symphonie fantastique, were introduced by a stunning contemporary piece, Christopher Theofanidis Rainbow Body.

In his charming footlight speech, Maestro DeMain told of the composer's fascination with medieval chants. He used the melody of plainsong by 12th century abbess Hildegard von Bingen..

The melody was introduced by Andra Padrichelli's cello. It worked its way through every instrument and in permutations, creating freshness and excitement in both musicians and audience. One startling effect, DeMain described as the sound of ecstasy, came from the "uvulation" of the musicians. Every player who did not have an instrument in his mouth was asked to make a remarkable vocal sound. The audience loved the work and this stunning "mystery" effect.

Soloist Hung made her appearance both musical and glamorous. I don't have the expertise to describe her lovely dress – please ask those more qualified. I can describe the music.

The Bruch concerto is one of the most popular works in the symphonic repertory. It deserves to be. Full of lovely melodies and exhilarating violin technique, the work moves through a range of dynamics keeping the violin always in central focus.

I often conduct my own private contest to decide the most beautiful concerto slow movement. The Bruch is always on the medal podium! Jessica played a haunting melody over and over. It is as if an operatic soprano got to sing the great aria not once, but many times.

The exhilarating final Allegro energico movement demonstrated Jessica's star-quality. After a sustained standing ovation, she rewarded the audience and her beaming colleagues with an unaccompanied Bach encore. When I was asked at intermission, "What was that?" I merely replied, "Exquisite."

Berlioz' Symphonie fantastique lives up to its descriptive name perfectly. Each of the five movements depicts the struggle, opiumenhanced, of an artist's life and times. The artist was, of course, the composer. The opium was an authentic adjunct to both the symphony and its creator ..

Each of the movements is a challenge to conductor and musician. Under Maestro DeMain's baton, the orchestra played magnificently. Amazing solos by members of each section are still whirling in my head as I write this.

John Kurokawa's clarinet, with the help of Rebecca Tryon's flute, maintained the idée fixe, the central theme of the lover. Eileen Whalen's oboe and Robyn Dixon Costa's English horn had starring roles as plaintive shepherds distracting the frenzied artist/hero. The famous March to the Scaffold 4th movement needed four timpanists and a cacophony of drums, cymbals and chimes to get our hero's head to depart from his body.

One of my favorite parts in the final movement is what I have called "the drunken woodwind choir." Every reed instrument was tootling away in a delightful musical discord.

I could go on and on about this great performance. I hope that each of these works, so perfectly fitted to our great orchestra and great hall, will be repeated soon.

Josh Halpern recital

Youth will have its day. Young and talented Oakwood sophomore Josh Halpern proved that in his performance at UD's Sears Recital Hall.

Josh is a very serious cellist. He plans to go on to music school and on to a career as a soloist. This was his first recital and watching and hearing his public debut made this

Like all first recitals, the program was overly challenging. Josh stepped onto the stage to play six parts of a Bach Suite for unaccompanied cello. I would liken such a task to walking naked in public on a very cold day. Everything is exposed!

Bach seemed to win the initial contest but Josh, confident and less nervous, tackled Brahms' magnificent E minor sonata. Pianist Byron Dobbs provided the piano accompaniment. From the very first notes, the special Brahms' sound was projected with clarity and élan.

Each of the three movements

was given a sympathetic and passionate reading. All memories of the naked walk through the Bach were erased.

The final work was even a greater challenge and a greater triumph. Josh and Byron played

Saint-Saëns Cello Concerto No. 1. Again, it was a marvel of wonderful music and magnificent sound.

We can all be proud and feel ourselves fortunate to have been at the beginning of a brilliant future for a very fine young man.



University. This was an important lesson for Kim, who didn't see the experience as a failure to achieve her original dream, but the opportunity to explore another possibility, another direction for her life.

Kim began her broadcasting career in 1979 when she joined local Dayton radio stations, WING -AM/WJAI-FM (which later became WGTZ-Z-93 FM). For 28 years Kim could be heard morning, mid-day or night, interviewing guests, playing music, and hosting community events. Her talent has been recognized by her peers, and Kim was inducted into the Radio/Television Broadcasters Hall of Fame of Ohio in 2006, the Dayton Area Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2007, and also on the 20th anniversary of her on-air debut by the Montgomery County Commissioners with a county proclamation, making it "Kim Faris Day". Today Kim continues to entertain and delight her listeners, hosting the afternoon broadcast at 99.9 LITE FM.

A teacher at Oakwood, Miss Verda Sieber, once told Kim's mother, "Kim will probably never be the best student, but she will be a success because she cares about people." This observation was spot on for Kim, who has been involved with people and organizations in the Dayton area for years. Organizations such as Project Read, The Walk for Women's Wellness, We Care Arts and The MDA, The Noble Circle Project, The Other Place, and the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation have benefitted from Kim's hard work and giving heart.

It is likely that anyone in Dayton who has ever listened to the radio knows who Kim Faris is, and knows of her successes. What they may not know is that this success is so much more meaningful than hours logged on air, the number of interviews conducted, or events she has hosted. Success to Kim is recognizing all the blessings that come into your life. For her this means a husband. two children, wonderful friends, and the opportunity to do something she loves. It's also about being able make a difference, by making maybe just one person smile a day. Kim has done that and so much more for over 30 years, distinguishing herself as an outstanding alumnus of Oakwood High School.

Rick Schwartz

Everyone who has attended Oakwood High School or lived within the city limits has heard of "the Dome". The nickname pokes fun at the idyllic neighborhood, known for its well-groomed, intimate neighborhood, and traditional values. Even today, Oakwood has a certain something that recalls less hectic, simpler times. Times like 1967, when Rick Schwartz was a senior at Oakwood High School. Rick and his fellow classmate and wife Jane Flory, grew up with values like those depicted in *Leave It to Beaver*, and *Ozzie and Harriet*.

Looking back, Rick Schwartz - longtime Daytonian and CEO of WinWholesale, thinks fondly of the unique aspects of Oakwood High School- the great teachers, competitive academic environment, friendships, and memories of wonderful buildings with Tudor architecture and fantastic woodwork. As a student, Schwartz also appreciated the values of hard work, discipline and goalsetting, as well as classical music that teachers like Oliver Sipe, William Kuhns and Fred Walker taught their students. They were challenging, but in the end it made things easy. Being able to manage a bigger workload and communicate effectively through writing were skills for which he has been thankful for everyday of his life. Schwartz carried these skills with him to the University of Akron, where he was a 4-year Air Force ROTC student in the Vietnam War Era. A few miles away from where he was studying industrial engineering, the Kent State protests occurred. 
