School Tech Team shows off BattleBot

The Oakwood Junior/Senior High School Tech Team proudly displayed at last night's Board of Education meeting a robot they designed and built for their firsttime BattleBot competition held March 27 at Piqua JVS.

Their robot, named Mortal KomBot, may have only made it to four rounds at competition, but it has left the team more determined to win next year.

"We hope to have two robots and go to nationals. We're also hoping for the best sportsmanship award," said junior/senior high school teacher Debbie Smith of her

The competition, hosted by the Dayton Tool & Die Machinery Assoc., judges on control, aggression and strategy demonstrated by the bots, as well as the last bot standing. "People think it's all about the robot, but a lot of it is about the driver, actually, not the robot," said team member Noah

The team members attended last year's competition as spectators and left inspired. "We came back and were so excited," said Smith. "The kids were already making

plans at that competition."

"We basically put this together at the last minute," said Faust. They gathered ideas, came up with a weaponless, wedge-shaped design, and began building their bot in January. The team demonstrated the operations of KomBot at the

"We will definitely compete again (and) we hope to start generating interest (in it)," said Faust.

His teammates include his brother, Issac, and Drew Smith, Jonathan Pearson, Sterre ter Haar, Caden Ohlwiler and Erin Cox.

- Creager Field


The city mailed out 3900

"We haven't got a lot of input. Which surprises me," said Oakwood City Manager Norbert Klopsch. "The biggest thing concerns significant changes at the OCC." Klopsch was referring to the possibility of removing at least two tennis courts and turning Collingwood Avenue into a one way straight-through street with more parking being made available.

A public hearing on the proposals for the Athletic/Recreation Master Plan will be held on Thursday, April 29 at 6:30 p.m at the Oakwood Community Center.

AFRL recipient of Aviation Trail award

The Air Force Research Laboratory at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base has been chosen by Aviation Trail, Inc. for its 2010 Trailblazer Award.

The ATI Board of Trustees, which selects the awardee each year, recognized the world-class quality of the laboratory's aerospace research for the U.S. Air Force; its economic impact on the area, especially with mission consolidation directed by the 2005 Base Closure and Realignment Commission (BRAC); and its many community outreach programs in Southwestern Ohio.

The banquet and ceremonies for presentation of the award will be held Friday, April 23 at the Presidential Banquet Center, 4548 Presidential Dr., in Kettering. Tickets are \$40 per person and the public is welcome. The social begins at 6 p.m. with dinner following at 6:45.

Reservations must be received by Monday, April 19 at Aviation Trial, Inc., P.O. Box 633, Wright Brothers Branch, Dayton, OH 45409.

The Air Force Research Laboratory is commanded and led by Maj. Gen. Ellen Pawlikowski, with responsibility for 10 technology directorates for research and development (R & D), and testing of air, space and cyberspace systems for the U.S. Air Force.

Accepting the award April 23 will be Joe Sciabica, the laboratory's executive director.

The laboratory directorates are Information, Space Vehicles, Vehicles, Propulsion, Directed Energy, Materials and Manufacturing, Munitions, Sensors, the Air Force Office of

Scientific Research, and the 711th Human Performance Wing. They are fully described at the laboratory's web site www.wpafb.af.mil/

Employing some 10,800 technical and support personnel, the laboratory has a \$2.2 billion science and technology program, with billions of dollars in research facilities, some of which are unique in the world. As such, it's one of the largest of the R & D units in Air Force Materiel Command which is head quartered at Wright-Patterson.

In addition to its on-site research, AFRL awards large and smaller contracts to local companies as well as major aerospace industries. In fiscal year 2009, AFRL obligated \$3.25 billion for research and development efforts across all technical directorates. This includes over \$209 million for research and development efforts where the principle place of performance was in the Dayton

The laboratory has close cooperative research relationships with colleges and universities in the Miami Valley and across the country. Its economic impact on the Dayton area is increasing with nearly 1,200 military and civilian positions, and their work units, moving here because of the 2005 BRAC.

Those work units are in aerospace medicine research, human performance, and sensors research and are generating \$332 million in on-base construction and renovation which will continue into 2011.

The laboratory has been a trailblazer in its formal and informal participation in educational

programs focused on furthering young people's interest in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) for students in grades K-12.

Those range from the Wright Scholar program that gives high school students summer work in the laboratory in a technical environment, to SEMEDS (for Scanning Electron Microscope) to Star Base, a Department of Defense program designed to ignite interest in math, science and technology for 5th graders in high-risk schools.

Additionally, AFRL has a vibrant cooperative education program with student researchers from 19 states and 50 universities.

Laboratory personnel are strong advocates of STEM education, have supported the Ohio state and national FIRST LEGO League youth robotics competitions, judge science fairs and engage youngsters in technical discussions at its booths at air shows.

The Trailblazer Award is given annually to recognize an organization or individual who has contributed to the aviation heritage of the greater Miami Valley. This is the 27th presentation of the award, which is timed to be near Wilbur Wright's birthday (April 16, 1867) The recipient last year was Amanda Wright Lane, greatgrandniece of the Wright brothers.

Formed in 1981 as a non-profit, Aviation Trail's first project was the development of a tourist trail of aviation-related sites laid out as a self-guided tour. The group's mission soon expanded to include preservation of two little-known original Wright brothers buildings still standing on their original sites in Dayton.





The RED Table Design Gala


will highlight the talents of the area's top designers. Forty tables will be decorated around a central theme, but each table will be distinctly different.

Dayton Opera has gone to charming and very talented. Hell! Don't be alarmed, dear readers. While Impresario Tom Bankston did bring the devil into Dayton, he proved, as the operatic Méphistophélès, to be quite

In fact, the customary "Bankston Magic" provided Dayton Opera audiences with a stunning production of Gounod's Faust. The ancient legend was compacted

from Goethe's rambling play by librettists Barbier and Carré into one of the most popular operas. Elegant direction by Kathleen Clawson gave the performance believability while spinning out the occult tale.

Our ages-old fascination with the devil is replete in literature. In the Faust legend we have all the elements. Faust sells his soul to the devil in exchange for youth and beauty. The beauty is in the form of Marguerite. Faust achieves Marguerite but leads to her destruction. She succumbs to his devil-aided charms, becomes pregnant, is shunned by society and condemned to death for killing the child.

How these very disturbing elements are handled from the opera stage is the challenge of the director. Kathleen Clawson kept Marguerite pure. The pregnancy was visible; her rejection by society, Faust and her brother, Valentin, made her a sympathetic victim and not a crazed monster. The infanticide was never appar-

Young and virile Kirk Eichelberger made his major role debut as Méphistophélès into a triumph. Poor Valentin, Marguerite's brother, gets killed by Faust with the help of the devil. with such clear beauty that the character became real and deserving of the audience's sympathy. This is a rare gift as this scene is often only a necessary precursor to the story.

When the devil appears to make his bargain, both characters interact with such openness that Kirk Eichelberger's Méphistophélès became "the devil you loved to hate." Kirk moved with such machismo that those of us of proper age would recall Errol Flynn in his signature roles. And yes, he also sang with the same virility!

Judicious cuts made the opera, while long, never tiresome. The set, simple units to represent the medieval village life, was kept a bit dark in most scenes. The magnificent starry night in Marguerite's garden was made more dramtic by this darkness.

While I try not to use the adjectives such as "best ever" in my reviews, I must name the final scene, Marguerite's resurrection, to be the best ever.

As the stirring music and Anne-Carolyn Bird's magnificent voice mounted, the prison bars became a scene of exploding galaxies, meteor showers and radiant light. John Rensel devised this thrilling display and every person in the audience welcomed Marguerite into her well-deserved celestial reward.

"Bankston Magic" continues for two performances, Friday April 16th and Sunday April 18th. Don't miss it or "the devil may get you!"







The Panther starting pitcher, Wayne Boggs, walked the bases loaded in the 1st inning to start the Jacks rally. Corey Bohache followed with a sacrifice fly, scoring the first run, and Trent Jervis delivered a run scoring single for the second run of inning. Boggs wiggled out of the jam with a strike out to retire the side. In the top of second inning, Boggs loaded the bases again with two hit batsmen and a walk, bringing up left fielder, Colin Morris. Morris slashed a two hopper through the third basemen, scoring Ian Munn. Boggs continued to struggle with his controlling, walking into two more runs and forcing in a third on a hit batsman, setting the stage for Robbie Wagner. Wagner launched Boggs 2-1 offering into the soybean field beyond the right field fence for a grand slam, narrowly missing a farmer preparing the field for planting. Oakwood responded with another six runs in the top of the third inning, sending 11 players to the plate and running the score to 17-2. Home runs by designated hitter, Addison Arbogast – a three run shot - and by Nathan Rickard - a two run homer - were the decisive blows for the Jacks. Beall quickly retired the Panthers in the bottom of 3rd, bringing the Jacks back to the plate in the top of the fourth. After a single by Beall, sweet-swinging Robbie Wagner lofted a drive into the spring sky. The Panther right fielder stood in place and craned his neck as the ball left the premises for Wagner's second home run of the contest. 


Darrel B. Ashworth

The team has also continued it's community service with Dayton Habitat for Humanity, creating energy efficient baskets for the new home owners and recently collected over 300 pairs of shoes for the Soles for Souls organization. Team members will soon be trained by University of Dayton students to use the thermal imaging camera and blower door (made possible with a generous grant from the Oakwood Education Foundation) and will begin completing home energy audits in the fall. The Energy Team focuses on empowering students to change their community and to make wise decisions about energy consumption in their future. The team is advised by Heidi Steinbrink.




