School Board School District earns 10th 'Excellent with Distinction' rating

Oakwood Schools can boast a decade now of earning the highest mark on Ohio's local school report card. The district received an Excellent with Distinction rating for the last school year, making for 10straight years in row, an honor formally presented to the Oakwood Board of Education last night. Susan Haverkos, who serves on the Ohio Board of Education, gave the Oakwood Board a Certificate of Commendation and banner that now hangs in their meeting room. Haverkos commended the district on its achievement and specially noted the students and their hard work that make the rating possible each year.

In other commendations at the meeting, the board introduced Oakwood High School junior Dan Edwards who developed the web site for 40 Developmental Assets, a community-wide initiative modeled after a concept that was launched years ago by West Carrollton City Schools. The web site is currently linked to Oakwood's district web site. Also commended were:

*Rachel Garrity, a seventh grader, who was recognized as the October Student of the Month for the junior high and the Oakwood Rotary Club.

*Leo Vanderburgh, a fifth grader, who was recently appointed Student Ambassador to Australia for People to People, an organization founded in 1956 by President Eisenhower. Vanderburgh will travel to Australia for 15 days next June and will include visits to government representatives, indigenous people and the Great Barrier Reef.

In their curricular showcase, the board introduced Mark Stiver, junior/senior high school industrial arts teacher, who showed projects from his students and reviewed the elements in his program. In junior high, he said the students are learning about measuring, safety, and following directions and plans. "I'm finding that a lot of them are gaining confidence," he said of the seventh graders in particular.

Two of their projects he showed included a pair of toaster tongs and a small bank.

In eighth grade, the program is an elective and emphasizes math applications and the importance of detail, said Stiver. Two of their projects include a solid fuel rocket and a 12-inch bridge made for holding and test measuring weight.

In ninth grade, Stiver said the students start out in groups and then work independently. "They're starting to, I hope, recognize craftsmanship," he said. They are being introduced to new machinery, more complex joiners, more assembly techniques and more precision. Two of their projects he showed were a wall box and a small nightstand.

Oakwood Board of Education will hold its next regular meeting Dec. 14, 7:30 p.m. at the District Central Office.

Initially this imported tree was bred to be safe and sterile, and became a popular ornamental. While the tree itself is not invasive where it stands, different strains of Callery Pear, including the popular Bradford Pear, have cross-pollinated to produce a small, inedible fruit that is spread by birds. The resultant offspring quickly revert to an earlier form that creates a thorny thicket,

"You drove all the way from Ohio to spend three days in Montreal?!"

The Canadian customs officer was staring as Wendy leaned over her frozen husband Bill to explain. The Campbells had flown into Burlington, VT to visit friends and enjoy fall leaves for a weeklong vacation. They had also been invited to visit Outremont, Quebec, as representatives of the Oakwood Sister City Association.

"Allez-y." They were waved through. The road signs were now all in French as the Campbells drove through the farmlands of southern Quebec. They stopped at a gas station and Wendy bought gas inside without English or sign language. The high school French was coming back. "When the Roman empire comes back, I will buy the gas," said Bill ruefully.

Outremont (pronounced OO tray MAW in French) is an arrondissement (borough) of Montreal located, as the name says, "over the mountain" (Mont Real) from the city and adjoining downtown. You have arrived when you read the sign "Outremont. Jumelages: Oakwood USA; Le Vesinet, France."

Wendy and Bill drove through

narrow one-way streets looking for the address. "Denis? Denis Trudeau?" Their host had been waiting for them in the darkness and cold. "Wendy and Bill?" The house number had been hard to read in the dark.

Monsieur Trudelle showed the apartment that the Sister City organization maintains for visitors where Wendy and Bill were to spend the night. There was lots of space, homey comforters on the beds, an orchid in a pitcher by the kitchen window and food bought especially for them in the refrigerator! C'est magnifique!

After a warm night's rest the tour began. Outremont itself has a delightful array of small business and restaurants. The library was fun to visit. Some books were in English but most of them were French.

On display was a silver platter commemorating the 25th anniversary of Oakwood and Outremont as sister cities. Le Vesinet, also an Oakwood sister city had one too (A group trip to Le Vesinet from Oakwood is in the works.)

Denis arranged for us to meet a family whose daughter wants to visit Oakwood. "Send us your proposed dates and we will see what we can do" Bill and Wendy were both excited by the possibility of the exchange.

Outremont is more urban than Oakwood but some of the homes and parks are just as magnificent. Parc Oakwood is tucked away in a very pleasant neighborhood. The toy set has a little puppet theatre and there is a stream that comes from out of nowhere and runs under a quaint footbridge. The English part of a plaque has the Oakwood crest on it and reads "Commemorating the tenth anniversary of the twinning of the cities of Oakwood and Outremont. This plaque was unveiled on June 20, 1986 by mayors Jeffrey Ireland and Jerome Choquette."

The tour kept on the move. Wendy and Bill were shown the sites, including Montreal's city hall. A favorite stop was the truly breathtaking Notre Dame Basilica. Denis dropped them off at the Hudson's Bay department store to shop (for warmer clothing) and then drove them around and up the mountain overlooking the town.

The final stop was a dinner at the Moulerie restaurant featuring mussels: les marinières, les italiennes, les indiennes, À la moutarde de Meaux, les marocaines, au Roquefort, les siciliennes, les gaspésiennes, les flamandes. Pick one !

Other members of the jumelage committee were there, including Francine Unterberg, the President of Outremont Sister City. 


Veterans from all four branches of military service were represented to help Smith school students celebrate during their annual Veteran's Day program last Wednesday.

'You Can't Beat the House'



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
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Education -

Current issues in education need to be addressed



Do family economic problems impact children's school success? The 11-10-09 issue of the Wall Street Journal headlined a short article as follows: "As Unemployment Rises, Kids' Future Dims." The heart of the concern was stated as follows: "A parent's job loss increases the probability that a child repeats a grade in school by roughly 15 percent," according to a new study by UC: Davis economic professors.

The stress on parents does impact their children. Parents need to know this and they need to do their best to shield their children from such tension. BUT SO DO THE SCHOOLS is the message for all educators. The children served by the schools are part and parcel impacted by the community. When the community is hurting, our schools need to beextrahelpfuland accommodating for the children in their care.

Will the move to National Curriculum Standards actually slow down state curriculum improvements? The answer seems to be already clear with a specific, "YES" being seen.

For example, math and English standards revision efforts in Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, and Pennsylvania have already been halted until the debate and work on new national standards has been completed. To the extent that this is typical across our nation, the result will be pushing more aggressive curriculum content standards welloff into the future.

Ohio, however, is moving in the opposite direction. A subcommittee of the State Board of Education was recent told that the proposed Common Core national standards calls for "fewer, clearer, and higher standards that will help improve academic performance." The state is committed to the new national approach. Delaying its own work until the national work is done may put the state in conflict with an edict by the General Assembly to revise English, math, science and social studies standards by June 30, 2010.

Are unfunded mandates continuingtoputourschoolsbetween and rock and a hard place? The clear and strong answer is "YES!" For example, the State now says that Oakwood and all other schools MUST provide ALL-DAY KINDERGARTEN in the very near future. Our local Board of Education will have to find at least four additional classrooms and hire four new teachers UNLESS class sizes are allowed to escalate up to the high 20s.

I am in favor of all-day kindergarten but NOT as a mandate. I am opposed to large class sizes as they will cut down on the leaning gains that all-day typically provides. To mandate something that would carry a MAJOR NEW COST for our local taxpayers is a huge mistake for the state and I also oppose that very strongly.

Issues and concerns about education are always there. Citizens need to be aware of them and to let leaders know how they would respond!

Arthur J. Huber

age 78, passed away peacefully on Sunday, Nov. 8, after a lengthy battle with Alzheimer's Disease. He was born in Dayton, Ohio, graduated from the University of Dayton in 1954, served in the U.S. Army for two years and then returned to Dayton where he was a partner in the CPA firm of Flagel, Huber and Flagel. He is survived by his wife Margie, three brothers – Dave, (Judy), Martin (Ray) and Steven, one sister - Barbara, three sons – Greg (Amy), Ted (Selina), Jonathon and six grandchildren. 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
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

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

tips to cooking your turkey out-

Use a barbecue injector, which enables you to inject some of the marinade into the turkey. Consider food gloves for handling the turkey. A meat thermometer is essential. Too high a temperature and the turkey skin will burn before the meat is fully cooked; too low a temperature will result in an undercooked turkey - and unhappy guests.

### Smoke 'Em Out

Use natural lump charcoal, not briquettes, which can have a chemical taste if not properly lit. Soak wood chips before placing them on the charcoal once the ash is well formed. Hickory or mesquite – either mixed in with the charcoal or in chip form - is a great choice and always available at the local grocery store.

### There's the Rub

Make your own rub from paprika, garlic and ground chili pepper. Avoid adding salt to the mix. Salt draws out the fluids from the turkey and you want your turkey as moist as possible.

#### **Stuff Yourself**

Cook stuffing separately, not in the

bird. In the bird, it stews rather than crisps, and comes out soggy, plus it throws off the cooking time for the bird.

### **Spice Up Your Gravy**

Make the gravy on the stovetop inside. Brown the turkey neck and giblets in butter or oil. Mince the neck and giblets, add them to the pan with some water and simmer on low to extract the flavors. Thicken with flour or cornstarch. Add some chipotle chile powder (a smoked red jalapeño) for color and spice.

#### **Pause Before Serving**

Be patient before putting the bird on the table. Let the bird rest for 20 minutes before carving to let the juices redistribute themselves. The bird will be much moister.

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

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## Modigliani quartet resonates with audience





The beginning of the season gave Dayton arts lovers so many wonderful performances that one could not see them all. I missed one of my favorites, Dayton Contemporary Dance Company. DCDC, one of the outstanding dance troupes in the world, clings to their current thesis of having only one performance of each of their Dayton appearances. Conflicts are inevitable.

I have lobbied for a return to a full weekend of their effervescent excitement. So far, no such luck. I will keep trying!

Impresaria Elana Bolling of Vanguard Concerts works hard to make her "one night stands" as conflict free as possible. This is no small feat when you consider the rich and crowded schedule.

The second concert of the season featured the return of the Modigliani Quartet from France. The young talents were an instant sensation with their debut in 2007. Since that time, their name has changed from Amadeo Modigliani to just Modigliani. They have also acquired new instruments.

Their music is now made on instruments that were crafted in Paris in 1863 by Jean-Baptiste Vuillaume. One of the legendary luthiers of that golden era, Vuillaume used the wood from a single tree to create the four instruments. The set, called The Evangelists, is a loan from a Swiss Foundation. Prior to the use by the quartet, they had not been heard for over 35 years.

Their program included Haydn's *Lobkowitz* quartet, Debussy's G minor quartet, a short Prelude and Fugue by contemporary composer Stéphane Delplace and the giant quartet No 6 by Felix Mendelssohn. The playing was extraordinary, brilliant without presumption. The musical lines and interplay of each work were given a crystalline interpretation.

There was a mutual resonating effect which, according to music lover and musician Dr. Peter Lauf, was due to the compatibility of the instruments, and perhaps, even from the soul of the tree that fathered them. I will give the tree much credit but give even more luster to these virtuosos.

#### WSU Opera

Wright State's Opera Department has a dual mission. Director and associate professor Kim Warrick loves opera. She loves to create singers and have them create beautiful music. Her students, like those of the theater department, are blessed with bountiful talents.

Part of Kim's goal is to develop singers to be performing artists or pedagogues in their chosen field. The other side of the coin, possibly the most important, is for Kim to instill a love of opera in those who go on to become doctors, accountants, parents - all who need that extra inspiration that comes from devotion to an art. At WSU, she manages to succeed at both.

I attended "Opera Scenes" which are fully staged excerpts sung to the piano accompaniment of Steven Aldredge. Pirates of Penzance, The Old Maid and the Thief, Suor Angelica, The Magic Flute, Romeo and Juliet and Carmen are a diverse selection. More than thirty students performed, with some singing several parts. Of particular note, Leslie Ann Lyons, Jennifer Blincoe and Kelsey DeMange were lovely as the Three Ladies and Anthony Sollenberger was a credible Tamio in "Flute." Sarah Bucher sang the difficult role of Suor Angelica. The memorable voices included Brad Mattingly and Lauren David in Romeo and Juliet.

Each year a full length opera is presented. In the miniscule confines of Schuster Hall, now slated for renovation, I have seen a *The Magic Flute*. This season's complete opera is John Gay's *The Beggar's Opera*. This 1728 musical play is the precursor of *The Three Penny Opera*, will be performed on Mother's Day weekend. Don't miss this rare opportunity.

#### Mary Poppins on Broadway

To me, the Great White Way of Broadway is fading. Many of the

new musicals are bereft of real music. Many of the revivals of great works of the past are hyped into nearly unrecognizable form.

A birthday treat for my four year old grandson, Oliver David, included a trip to Broadway's *Mary Poppins*. I knew this legendary musical would be his delight, but never predicted it would be mine, as well.

What made the production great was its perfect stagecraft. The Banks family's house was brilliantly conceived. The bank where Mr. Banks worked was a dramatically distorted colonnade. And, when Mary Poppins flew, her umbrella firmly in her hand, her calm poise unruffled, it didn't matter that the wires were visible. Her ascension seemed like magic.

Mary and the entire cast sang and danced with energy and verve. It was not a hype-filled display of special effects although all the effects were truly special. Children and adults alike were mouthing the familiar lyrics, myself included.

This was a return to real musical theater. I never thought Mary Poppins would save Broadway. I may have underestimated her.

#### Muse Machine recital

The Dayton Art Institute and the Muse Machine have been collaborating in presenting recitals which combine art and music. These Sunday afternoons are a pure delight even when the music is not of my genre.

Last Sunday, it was perfect. Dayton Philharmonic trumpeter Ashley Hall and her husband, trumpeter Nathan Tighe, have been collaborating on Muse Machine programs for the past two years. In addition to all their other musical activities and Nathan's pre-medical studies, they have been devoted to bring the message of the relationship between music and art to young people throughout the region.

The recital at the DAI was evidence of what a great program this is and what gifted musicians and teachers Ashley and Nathan are. With their bevy of trumpets, they played music which illustrated the essence of paintings from ancient art through to modern abstraction and minimalism.

The clarity of their message and its enthusiasm are winning examples of how many great young persons are ready to carry the torch for a better world.
